An Extraordinary Opportunity

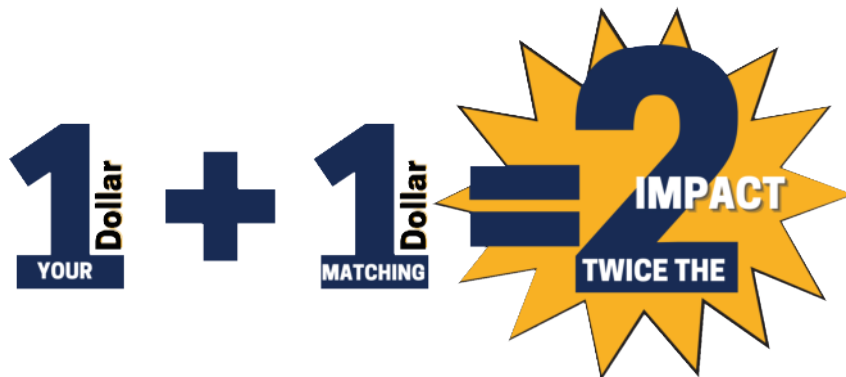

SARAH ANNE STAPLES HALL

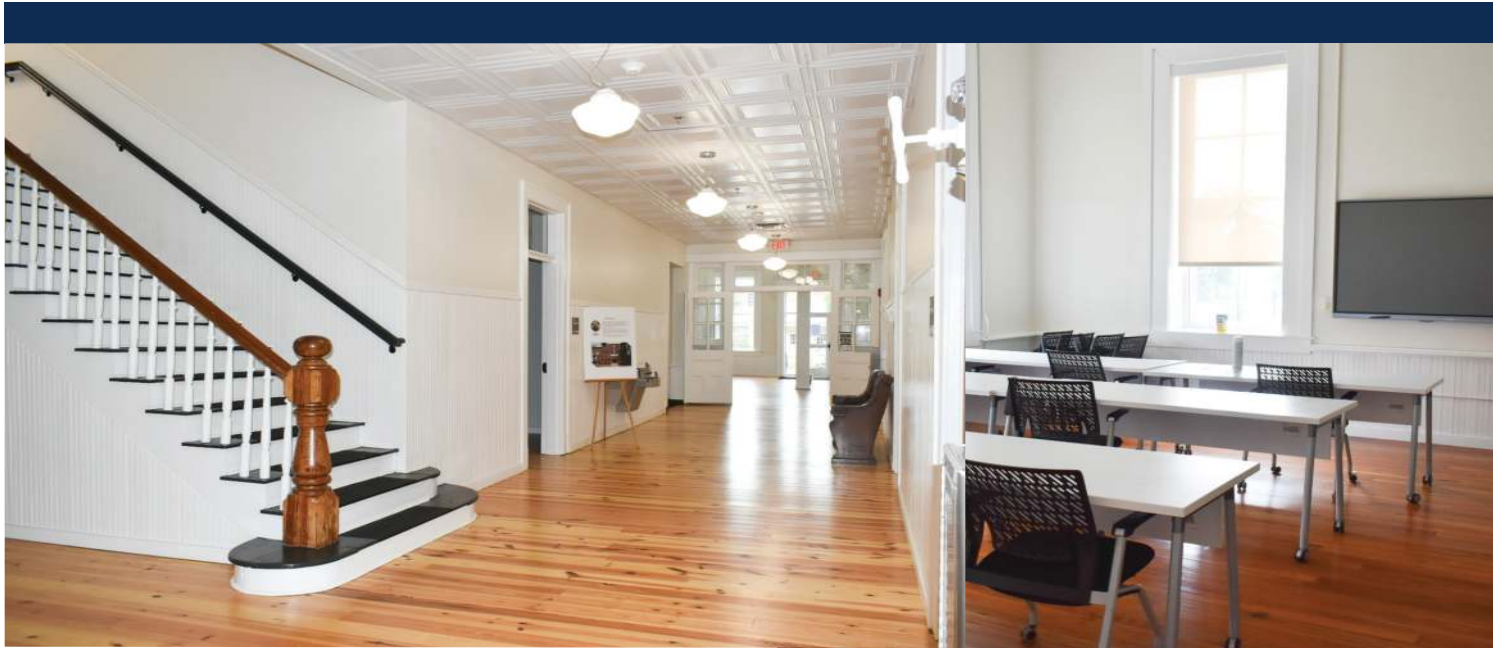

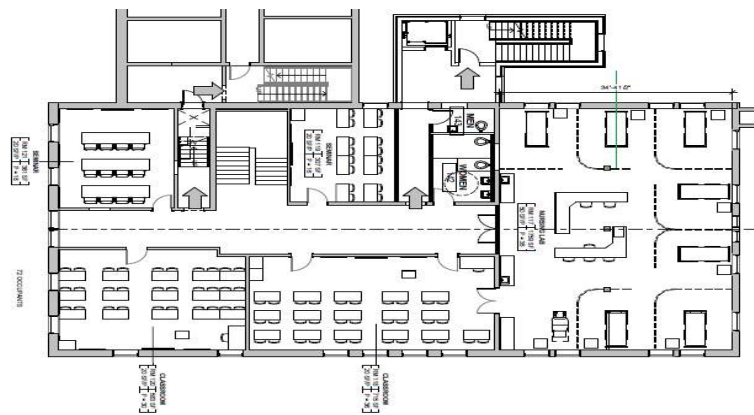

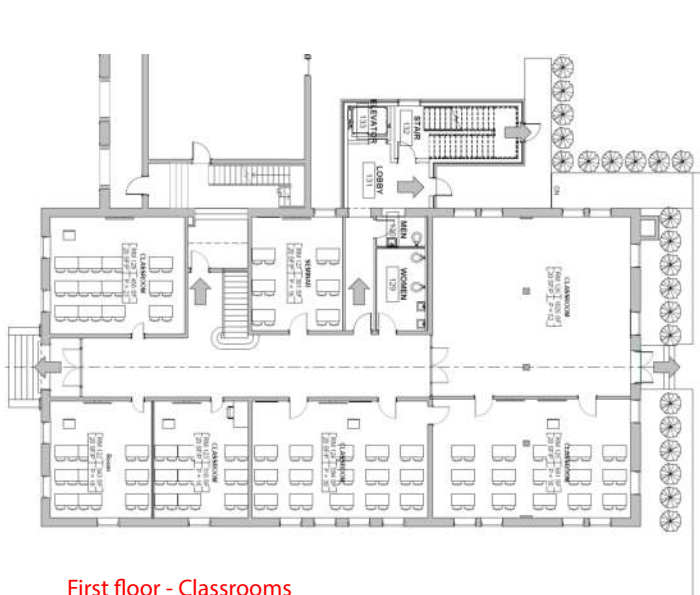

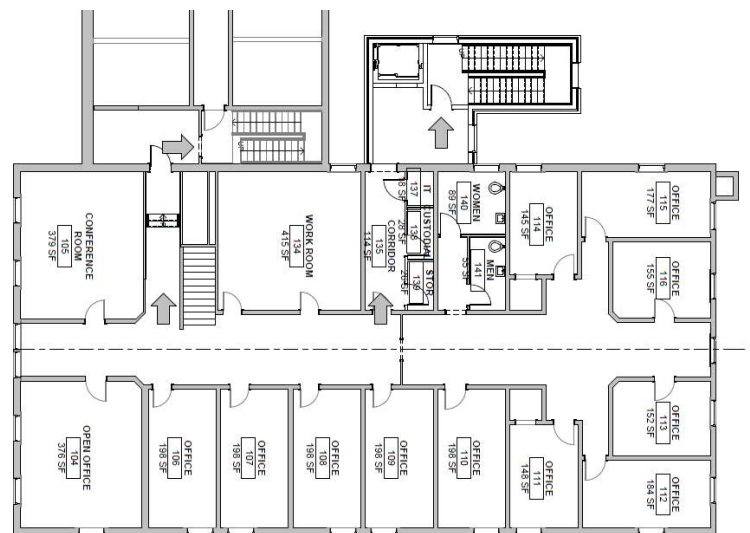

CAMPUS EXPANSION SEEKS TO HELP REVITALIZE DOWNTOWN CUTHBERT

With the generous support from the community and the prudent purchasing power of the College, several buildings have been acquired in downtown Cuthbert-particularly on the square. Because of this, we have moved some of the College's fine arts functions downtown, including visual arts, theatre arts production, and the music department.

A new space was added to downtown Cuthbert this past year, nestled between 80 Peachtree and the Richard Taylor Family Center for Musical Studies, "Magnolia Alley" offers a place to honor our heritage while also creating a place where students and our community can come together.

As Andrew becomes more regionally relevant in its academic offerings, it also wants to be a good community partner. The relocation of programming to the square is also spurring economic growth as it improves the town and gown relationship.

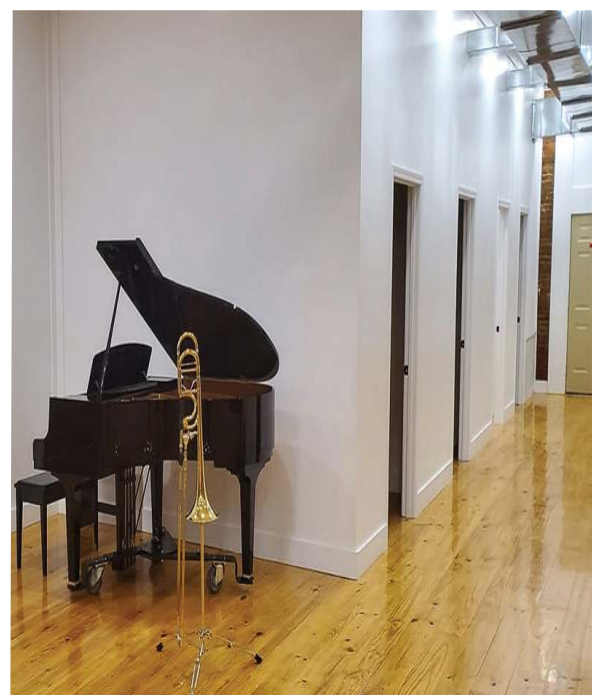
