Patricia Puckett Goodman, Dr. Patterson's granddaughter, spoke on behalf of Mrs. Ann Patterson Puckett Bynum and the family at the event, in addition to remarks by Dr. Linda R. MASKED FOR THE TASK

Creating safe spaces on campus during the COVID-19 pandemic



Our students and faculty started classes this Fall with measures in place for safety due to the COVID-19 virus. Though it was challenging, our students, faculty, and staff navigated it beautifully. The plan for how to tackle the issue was one that required an "all hands on deck" approach. With guidance from local health authorities, it was decided that we could safely open for in-person learning. A comprehensive plan was created that involved everything from social distancing classrooms to sanitizing spaces. It was also decided that an online COVID-19 tracker would list the number of cases for Andrew students and employees. This created transparency in the number of cases without HIPPA violations. Launch of Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education with a K-12 Reading Endorsement

Andrew College is launching a new Bachelor of Science program and a standalone K-12 Reading Endorsement that will be available starting Fall Semester 2021.

Andrew College is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACSCOC) Commission on Colleges to award certificates, associate, and baccalaureate degrees. The new program received approval last week from GaPSC (Georgia Professional Standards Commission).

Andrew College Academic Dean, Dr. Karan Pittman shared specifics on the timeline of the process. Pittman stated, "We received confirmation to offer the Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education by our institutional accrediting agency, Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) in February 2020. In October 2020, Georgia Professional Standards evaluated the program and made a recommendation that Andrew College move forward with the program, which received final approval at their board meeting on December 10th."

According to Andrew College President Dr. Linda Buchanan, offering the new program is important to meet a critical need based on the specific needs of elementary students with regard to literacy development in our local communities in Southwest Georgia and beyond. Buchanan said, "We are so excited about offering this degree. We know how critically important reading proficiency is for our children, and the gaps in that ability that must be filled in order for children to succeed in school and life. We are looking for students with a passion for teaching children in rural areas, with particular passion for instilling a love of reading."

The Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education is a four-year degree, and the standalone K-12 Reading Endorsement is a three-course program that is a total of nine credit hours. According to Andrew College Director of Elementary Education, Dr. Lourdes H. Smith, these programs will prepare future educators in a multi-faceted approach. "This program is designed for students who are interested in an opportunity for intellectual, social, and spiritual growth as a way to professionally succeed in becoming an outstanding teacher in the realm of elementary education and reading," stated Smith.

Teacher candidates will be screened before admission to ensure quality. Candidates must meet admissions standards. After the application form has been filled out and returned, students must complete an interview with program faculty to assess attributes and dispositions beyond academic ability. Students must submit at least two letters of recommendation from former employers/teachers/mentors attesting to the personal character of the applicant.

The Andrew College Athletic Department teams are members of the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA), and per the COVID-19 Rules established by the NJCAA, with the exception of Men's & Women's Cross Country teams, were allowed to practice for 60 consecutive days. Each team was allowed 4-15 scrimmages, depending on the sport, in the 2020 Fall Semester. The Men's & Women's Cross Country teams maintained their regular fall semester schedules, participating in several meets. The rest of the men's and women's intercollegiate athletic teams, for the men-baseball, basketball, golf, and soccer; for the women - softball, basketball, and soccer, welcomed their teams in August and began practice after Labor Day. The baseball team played 12 scrimmages and wound up their fall with their Annual Navy vs. Gold World Series, men's basketball hosted three scrimmages in the Jinks Gymnasium, men's soccer traveled for a pair of matches, men's golf traveled for one tournament, softball played 7 doubleheaders, both home and away, women's soccer had 3 away matches, and women's basketball had one home game. The spring semester will be filled with eight teams participating in their regular seasons, with the region, district, and national tournaments to follow. The basketball teams had their seasons reduced to 22 games and will tip-off after January 20. Baseball and softball will each begin January 22, men's and women's soccer had the biggest adjustment, switching from a fall semester season to a spring season that will begin after April 1, and golf will begin tournament play after January 22. 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The Andrew College Theatre Program (A.C.T) presented "Cuthbert Speaks: Voices from the Dead" this Fall. The play was performed outdoors at a series of campus locations to small, socially distanced audiences. The show encompasses a series of monologues and scenes centered on various historical characters buried in Cuthbert, including the College's first female president and Jazz great, Fletcher Henderson. This new play began with a Tourism Development Grant received by the city for a "cemetery play." Dr. Lela Phillips researched and created several skits over the summer that have been edited and developed by the Theatre program. Actors include Theatre majors: Jazzmine Curry, Mason Flury, Shannon Green, Darris Hodges, Dylan Kelly, and Antonyo Myers, as well as Music major Gabriel Negron and Liberal Arts major, Hasani Comer. The performance will be recorded and entered in Region 4 of the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival so that students will be eligible for nomination to compete in the Irene Ryan regional acting scholarship audition. A.C.T. received feedback during a virtual response session by KCACTF 4 respondents, including Todd Ristau, chair of the MFA playwriting program at Hollins University in Roanoke, VA. The response from KCACTF was encouraging. Sophomores Jazmine Curry and Antonyo Myers, as well as freshman Shannon Green have received Irene Ryan nominations. They will compete at the virtual region festival in February.

The painting was developed over the course of three days and highlights landmarks, people, and the natural wildlife of Albany, GA. The exhibition is on view at AMA until Feb. 20, 2021.

As part of the "Light Up Midtown Murals" project in Columbus, GA, Andrew art students have been designing and painting a huge threepanel mural. Columbus State University invited our students to develop an image for this revitalization and economic development campaign.



Andrew College students worked side-by-side with CSU students and other regional artists. The mural totals 120 feet long by 14 feet high. The unveiling for this mural was held at the Light Up Midtown event on Saturday, November 21st. Their mural, titled "Rapid Transit," is a permanent installation and is located on the 13th St corridor at 11th Ave.



Fall Convocation



He is also an adjunct professor for several colleges and institutions. Dekmar received an Honorary Doctorate Degree from Central Police University, Taipei, Taiwan and an Honorary Doctorate Degree from LaGrange College, LaGrange, Georgia.

Arts on the Square has been scheduled for March 27th, 2021. Since the event is outdoors, we are planning to proceed, weather permitting. We hope to see you there.

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
