Mr. Richard B. and Mrs. (Sherrie) Taylor recently made a contribution to the college for the music department. The music building will now be known as the Richard B. Taylor Music Center. Richard is a native of Cuthbert and a 1971 cum laude graduate of Andrew College. The arts are important to the Taylor family as Sherrie was a former professional ballerina and their son Andrew is an aspiring musician. A ribbon-cutting and dedication ceremony was held as part of the Arts 'Round the Square Event this spring. Taylor's son Andrew performed musical selections with Assistant Music Professor Dr. Dan Kolan as part of the festivities. During the ceremony, Richard spoke of his love for Andrew College and the area. Taylor has served as a trustee of Andrew College since 2011. The Andrew College community and its music students are grateful for the generosity and support of the Taylor family.

New Scholarship Endowment

Hal and Cheryl Meadows '70 of Cuthbert recently established the Meadows-Grubbs Endowed Scholarship Fund for the use and benefit of Andrew College. To be awarded annually, the Meadows-Grubbs Endowed Scholarship is presented to a student(s) studying in the field of agribusiness, forestry, or sustainable agriculture. Students are eligible to receive the scholarship in either their first or second academic year and need to be in good academic standing, with first preference given to students from Clay, Randolph, Stewart, or Quitman Counties. If no eligible student is identified, then a second preference will be given to a student within any area of study from Clay, Randolph, Stewart, or Quitman Counties.





Andrew College will have a new green space, thanks to the generosity of Ernie C. Wright of Columbus. Wright is an Andrew College alum ('76) and board member. This new space will replace part of the Rhodes Hall parking lot and is the beginning of a larger campus vision.

During the start of the work last week on the parking lot, while excavating the old parking lot asphalt, Max Pittman of P & P Land Services uncovered an area that included some of the original materials of the college building that burned in 1892. Small pieces of brick, glass, china, pottery, and some metal hardware, including nails and a hinge, were uncovered. The next step with these artifacts is to clean and identify them as much as possible. They will eventually be put on display. After that, the parking lot will be regraded where the asphalt was taken. Sidewalks will be placed in strategic locations, and, in June, the area will be landscaped.



Arts 'Round the Square Round Up

Andrew College hosted the 3rd Annual Arts 'Round the Square Festival on March 27 in historic downtown Cuthbert. Attendees experienced live art, theatre, music and enjoyed shopping at the Cuthbert Farmers Market. The festival concluded with the dedication ceremony for the Richard B. Taylor Music Center. The festival included two venues open for tours, the Fletcher Henderson House in Cuthbert and the Center for Arts & Rehabilitative Energies, Inc., located in Shellman, Georgia. This year, Arts 'Round the Square was dedicated to Mary Jane Salter's loving memory, who helped start the event in 2018.











Up for Debate


The Humanities Division hosted a debate on April 9th, pitting students against faculty in order to model civil discourse for the campus and show off the research, speaking, and critical thinking skills of our students. The student team was composed of Dylan Kelly, Mason Flury, and Antonyo Myers, while the faculty team was manned by Bob Kortbawi and Amanda Knight. The debate topic was randomly selected from a list of five nationally impactful ones, and the students chose to defend the resolution: Immigrants should be welcomed to the US. The faculty chose to attack their position by counter-proposing that only legal immigrants should be welcomed to the US. The students eloquently presented carefully thought out evidence and logic to support their side, but the faculty was judged to be the winner by a slim margin of only three points. (Points are earned by refuting every argument that the opposition raises.) The students, faculty, and audience members enjoyed the match of wits and vowed to debate more often. Faculty members Sherri Cartwright and Michelle Collins assisted with judging and time-keeping.







Prize for Prose



Andrew College's Phi Zeta Chapter of Sigma Kappa Delta, the English Honors Society, has been awarded a \$200 prize from the SKD National Honor Society for their "Epistolary History: Letters to Coronavirus" event. This chapter activity award is a highly coveted prize given to the chapter that best promotes the aims of SKD. Students, community members, and faculty logged into Zoom to participate and learned about the significance of the representation of all groups that experienced important historical events captured through the lost art of letter writing, and participants wrote their own letter to Coronavirus. The Epistolary History project was unique and appropriate, recording the reactions of people living through this time, making them think about the future and this event in the scope of their lives. Among the over 30 participants were Sigma Kappa Delta members Kenyaly Quevedo, Raina Plunske, Hasani Comer, Marchell Johnson, and Alexia Jones. The Andrew College Phi Zeta Chapter of Sigma Kappa Delta, the National English Honor Society for Two-Year Colleges, was established in 2019. All inductees must have completed at least one course in college-level English with a "B" or better, completed at least twelve semester hours, and have an overall G.P.A. of 3.0. The objectives of Sigma Kappa Delta are to confer distinction for high achievement and general scholarship in English language and literature, to provide cultural stimulation on college campuses through local chapters, to foster community within English departments, and to encourage creative and critical writing. Professor Penny Dearmin serves as Advisor.

HISTORY MAKING SEASON

The Andrew College Athletic Department teams are members of the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA), and per the COVID-19 Rules established by the NJCAA, the men's and women's soccer teams, and the men's and women's basketball teams all had a major disruption to their normal schedules that proved to be a tough thing to overcome. Men's and women's soccer had their seasons moved from an August start to an April start, and with a reduced season length, forced a reduction in pre-conference games.



Men's and women's basketball saw their seasons severely shortened, from 30 to 22 games, plus a mid-January start from a normal November 1 start, which resulted in a brutal three games a week season. Baseball, Softball, and Men's Golf all had a normal spring schedule. Women's basketball forward Taliah Wesley was named to the Georgia Collegiate Athletic Association (GCAA) 1st Team All-Region team and graduated Magna Cum Laude. Softball made the GCAA playoffs for the third time in five years and walloped South Georgia State 16-5 in the opening round before falling in the quarterfinals. Head Softball Coach Kayla Williams recorded her 100th career win during the season, a 1-0 win over Wallace State-Dothan (AL) on February 25. Golfer Conner Hixson won the GCAA Region 17 Men's Golf Individual Championship, winning a three-man playoff when he parred the first playoff hole, while the others bogeyed the hole. Emil Wallinder finished in a T4th and was named to the GCAA All-Region Team with Hixson. Baseball had its most successful season ever this spring, establishing a new singleseason record for wins with 35, besting the 32 wins of the 2007 team, and captured the first-ever NJCAA Region 17 Baseball Championship in the 37-year history of the baseball program. Three players were named to the GCAA 1st Team All-Region team (Kaleb Podger, Jacob Pierce, and Jack Hay), a program first, one player named to the GCAA 2nd Team All-Region (Jake Edwards), and four players named to the GCAA Gold Glove team (Podger, Pierce, Edwards, and Jonah Stout), also a program record. Podger was named the GCAA Player of the Year, another program first, and Pierce was named the GCAA Defensive Player of the Year. Head Baseball Coach Blake Williams earned his 200th career win, with a 6-5 victory over Enterprise State (AL) on February 17. Head Softball Coach Kayla Williams earned her 100th career win, with a 0-1 victory over Wallace College (AL) on February 25th.

The academic success of the student-athletes at Andrew College continues, both as teams and individuals. Men's golf posted the highest team GPA with a 3.54, followed by Softball with a 3.22, Baseball at 3.17, and Women's Soccer at 3.07, as the overall GPA of the Athletic Department was a solid 2.87 across nine sports. Eighteen individual student-athletes were named to the Dean's List (3.5 - 3.99 GPA), and another fourteen made the President's List (4.0 GPA). In addition, student-athletes earned eight of the eleven highest awards given to an Andrew College student, including all three of the Andy Awards given this year, for Leadership (Women's Basketball - Taliah Wesley), for Achievement (Men's Soccer - Hasani Comer), and Service (Baseball - Colby Fields). Student-athletes also received nineteen of the twenty-seven Departmental Awards given in a full range of academic disciplines. In the Spotlight

In November, ACT presented "Cuthbert Speaks: Tales from the Dead" as our KCACTF Region 4 Associate Production. The show was performed live and outdoors at four on-campus locations by Jazmine Curry, Hasani Comer, Mason (Bear) Flury, D.J. Hodges, Dylan Kelly, Antonyo Myers, and Gabriel Negron. Our Production Assistant was Jordan Cunningham. This show was adapted from skits written and researched by Dr. Lela Philips and supported by a GA Council for the Arts grant. The performance was entered into the National Playwriting Program of KCACTF and received feedback during a response session conducted by NPP representatives from Clemson University and Hollins University. KCACTF/NPP respondents nominated Jazmine Curry, Antonyo Myers, and Shannon Green to compete in the Irene Ryan audition competition at the region festival.

- "Cuthbert Speaks" was performed at the historic Greenwood Cemetery during Arts 'Round the Square and included instructor Deborah Liss-Green in the cast.
- Despite four weeks of instructor quarantine in the spring, the program embarked upon a semester-long production development process. Beginning with Introduction to Performance class and with two live Zoom performance workshops, the program created a devised work called "Lost and Found." The work, combining personal narrative, poetry, prose, and ethnographic study to explore identity, loss, and resilience, will debut in Magnolia Alley at 7:00 PM on April 22.

- Hasani Comer and DJ Harris were cast in ten-minute plays for the National Playwriting Project at KCACTF Region 4. KCACTF 4 is a 7 state region of the national festival, in which Andrew College Theatre participates annually.
- Deb Liss-Green served as a regional directing mentor during the KCACTF region festival.
 As a mentor, she worked with student directors from Georgia Southern and Florida
 International universities as they rehearsed and recorded new plays.
- As a KCACTF NPP respondent, Deb responded (virtually) to productions of new work at South Georgia College and Clayton State University.
- Deb Liss-Green and Theatre major Dylan Kelly attended a two-day long Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival workshop on anti-racist theatre practices, conducted by Kennedy Center trainers.


